“Forever Free” Traveling Exhibit

The New Bern-Craven County Public Library is one of only sixty-three libraries nationwide selected to host "Forever Free: Abraham Lincoln's Journey to Emancipation."

This traveling exhibit will be on display at the library from November 15th, 2009 through January 6th, 2010.

“Forever Free” examines President Lincoln's thoughts about slavery throughout his political career and the conditions which led to the Emancipation Proclamation. It traces Lincoln's gradual transformation from an antislavery moderate into "The Great Emancipator," who freed slaves with a war-time proclamation in 1863.

Organized by the Huntington Library, San Marino, CA, and the Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History, New York City, in cooperation with the American Library Association Public Programs Office (ALA), the exhibition is made possible through major grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) and the Abraham Lincoln Bicentennial Commission, created by Congress and charged with planning the national celebration of Lincoln's 200th birthday.

“Forever Free” draws upon original

documents in the collections of the Huntington Library and the Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History.

“We are honored to have been selected as a site for this exhibition” said Librarian Joanne Straight. “People of all ages from fourth grade students to senior citizens read and study the causes and events of the Civil War.

Local history, including the development of James City, a community established for freed black slaves, will also be examined in programs and through a collection of documents and artifacts on loan from Tryon Palace Historic Sites and Gardens, New Bern Historical Society and the James City Historical.

Free tours of New Bern Battlefield Park, including an encampment, will be offered by the New Bern Historical Society from 12-4 p.m. on Saturday, November 21. Battlefield Park is located off Highway 70 East in Taberna.

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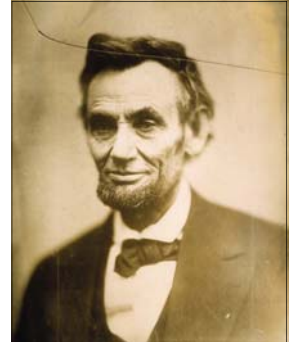
President and Mrs. Lincoln to Visit Library

Joseph Glatthaar to present Robert E. Lee Lecture

Join the Friends of the Library on Sunday, October 25th at 3 p.m. for a lecture on “Robert E. Lee, the Army of Northern Virginia and Confederate Defeat” by Dr. Joseph Glatthaar. Glatthaar, a renowned historian, is Stephenson Distinguished Professor of History at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He is author of

numerous books and articles, including: *General Lee’s Army: From Victory to Collapse and Forged in Battle: The Civil War Alliance of Black Soldiers and Their White Officers.*

Program on History of James City

Author and historian, Joe Mobley, will deliver a lecture on the history of James City on Saturday, December 5 at 2 p.m.

James City began as a settlement for slaves seeking freedom and protection within Union lines during the Civil War. From that time until 1900, James City according to Mobley, “remained a cohesive black community whose inhabitants struggled collectively to secure an economic and political

foothold.”

Joe Mobley, a former administrator with the North Carolina Office of Archives and History, is currently a faculty member in the Department of History at North Carolina State University. He also wrote a number of books and articles related to the history of North Carolina including *James City: A Black Community in North Carolina, 1863-1900.*

William Henry Singleton Program

The New Bern-Craven County Public Library will present a lecture titled, "William Henry Singleton's Recollections of My Slavery Days: A North Carolina Slave's View of the Civil War and its Legacies" on Tuesday, January 5, 2010 at 7 p.m., with Dr. Katherine Mellon Charron

In 1922, William Henry Singleton, a former slave and Union Army veteran, published an autobiography that provides a fascinating glimpse of life in a North Carolina coastal city and rural neighborhood.

Born a slave in 1843 in New Bern, Singleton grew up on a remote coastal plantation at Garbacon Creek. During a meeting with President Lincoln in the summer of 1862 he urged the president to sanction black military service. It was not until May 1863 that Singleton's dream of fighting as a Union soldier was finally realized. He enlisted in New Bern as a sergeant in the 35th United States Colored Troops.

Katherine Mellen Charron, Assistant Professor of History at North Carolina,

explores what Singleton's narrative reveals about a place and the people in it, about slavery and freedom, and the bridge between the two. Dr. Charron and David Cecelski edited the 1999 reissue of *Recollections of My Slavery Days*.

From the Librarian's Desk



This is an exciting time for the New Bern-Craven County Public Library. Several special programs

are offered in conjunction with the national traveling exhibit "Forever Free: Abraham Lincoln's Journey to Emancipation". The exhibit served as the impetus to put together programs that not only look at national events but also explore our local history. The full schedule of exhibit programs is described elsewhere in this newsletter.

We want to thank the New Bern Historical Society, Tryon Palace Historic Sites and Gardens and the James City Historical Society for their assistance with displays and exhibit programs.

A generous grant from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation allowed us to purchase several laptop computers that will be used for computer instruction and library programs. Utilizing laptop computers for instruction allows us to move the classes to a separate room which will be less disruptive for both the class members and users of the adult reading area. Additional grant funds will enable us to replace nine of the oldest public desktop computers.

The Gates Foundation Opportunity Online grant is a two year grant that requires a 50% match by the library. Craven County will provide \$5,000 of our required \$9,282 match. We will rely

on donations and fund raising to meet the balance of our obligation due by March 2010.

The Friends of the Library designated September 14-19, 2009 as Staff Recognition Week. They treated all staff members to a delicious buffet luncheon in the library auditorium on September 16. Hayden Jones was recognized for 47 years of service.

Lincoln's Final Years

Dr. David Long will discuss "Lincoln's Approach to Immortality: The Final Years of Abraham Lincoln" at 3 p.m. on Sunday, November 15 in the library auditorium.

Dr. Long, an associate professor of history at East Carolina University, spent twelve years as a trial lawyer and prosecutor. This legal experience provides rare insight into Lincoln's development and the influence of his earlier career in advocacy.

Long is the author of *The Jewel of Liberty: Abraham Lincoln's Re-election and the End of Slavery*, which was nominated for five of the most prestigious prizes in the field of U.S. history including the Pulitzer Prize and the Lincoln Prize. He has also published articles for journals including *Civil War His-*
