EBSCO Auto Repair Reference Center contains repair information on most major manufacturers of domestic and imported vehicles from 1945 vintage cars to the latest models. Users will have access to wiring

diagrams, step by step photographs and drawings, recall notices, and maintenance schedules. Auto

repair information is also available on the library's website

(newbern.cpclib.org) through ChiltonLibrary.com.

EBSCO Literary Reference Center will be useful to students and readers seeking more information about authors or books. Available resources include over 5,000 author interviews and author biographies, literary criticism, plot summaries, book reviews, short stories and poetry.

Geographic Research Simply Maps is a web based mapping application using the most current demographic, business, and marketing data available to create professional quality thematic maps.

Online newspaper resources will be upgraded through **EBSCO News**-

paper Source Plus

which offers full text coverage for 149 national and international newspapers including USA Today, The New York Times, Boston Globe, The Washington Post, The Times (London) and the Irish Times. Regional newspaper coverage is also included.

Downloadable audio books through **NetLi-brary's eAudio** will be discontinued. Recent statewide budget cuts are responsible for the decision not to renew this resource. Our staff is looking at possible alternatives to allow local listeners to continue to enjoy this service.

NC Live is a statewide collaboration among public and academic libraries funded through the NC General Assembly. It offers content and indexing from more than 50,000 newspapers, journals, magazines, encyclopedias, e-books, e-audio, and streaming video titles. New Computer Classes

Starting in January 2009, the library will be offering two new free computer classes: Mouse and Keyboard and Job Hunting on the Internet.

Mouse and Keyboard will be a class for computer users of any level—beginning & intermediate.

This class will cover mouse basics and a review of keyboarding. If you've never taken keyboarding before or want to improve your skills, this class is for you.

Job Hunting on the Internet will explore useful websites of

interest to job seekers as well as the basics of formatting a resume and cover letter. This class is for computer users who are familiar with the mouse and keyboard and have basic Internet skills.

Also, the library is revising all of its computer classes to reflect more current

versions of Internet Explorer & Microsoft Word.

All computer classes are free. Students are provided with a syllabus which can be used during the class and taken home for continued instruction.

Classes are offered during the mornings and afternoons; a few classes will be offered on Saturday mornings. Current class schedules and descriptions of our classes are kept on the display table near the flag as you enter the main Reading Room.

Those of you who enjoy down-loadable audio books may be aware that NC Live is discontinuing this service on January 1, 2009. We are looking at options and will let you know if we are able to implement an alternative service.

One goal for the library in 2009 is to redesign our website. We'd like to make it more visually appealing, informative and easier to locate resources. Many people are unaware of all the services currently available on our site. You may download legal forms through *Gale Legal Forms*, check *ChiltonLibrary.com* for

car repair information, locate local obituaries through our obituary index, view local photographs in our digital history exhibit, and get medical advice through **Salem Health**.

Library card holders may also take advantage of the many resources offered through NC Live including *Morningstar Investment Research Center*, view documentary and educational video programs online, read full text magazine and newspaper articles, trace your family history on *HeritageQuest* or use *Learning Express Library* to take a wide variety of practice tests including ASVAB, GRE, nursing and real estate exams.

We anticipate being busier than ever as people rely more on the library for their entertainment and informational needs. Where else can you rent a video or DVD for one week for just \$1? Educational videos and DVDs may be borrowed for three weeks without charge. Music compact discs and books on CD or tape are also loaned for the same period.

Our computer software is being updated and soon should include both Office 2003 and 2007, making it easier for individuals who use computers at multiple locations.

Your public library provides many resources to help cope with the challenges caused by the current economic recession. You can reduce stress with soothing music from our collections of CDs, take an online class to improve your skills or check out a book on money management. Your library card opens up a world of opportunities.

Registration is under way for the book discussion series *Divergent Cultures: The Middle East in Literature.* Participants will meet every three weeks on Monday evenings beginning January 12, 2009, to discuss five titles focusing on the Middle East.

This new series is especially appropriate at a time when world news continues to focus on events in this region. Readers will consider ancient and modern conflicts to develop an understanding of the divergent cultures, faiths and people and their stories of triumph and

tragedy.
