B ABRAHAM *Abraham: The First Historical Biography* by David Rosenberg

With the help of hundreds of thousands of cuneiform tablets deciphered since the 1920's as well as close analysis to Biblical texts, Rosenberg fleshes out Abraham the Patriarch to Abraham the man. He views Abraham as bearer as well as founder of culture, very much a Sumerian as well as the first Jew.

B CARPENTER *Getting Better All the Time* by Liz Carpenter It's about living alone after leaving Washington – Just ok reading.

B CHURCHILL *Jennie: The Life of Lady Randolph Churchill* by Ralph G. Martin

Good book. I first read it in the 1970's. Jennie, the mother of Winston Churchill was quite a person.

B CLAIBORNE *The Irresistible Revolution* by Shane Claiborne This is a personal non-fiction account of a young man who practices "radical" Christianity, within his community of like-minded believers. He also takes his ideas to "the streets" by demonstrating for social justice: a fascinating "compare and contrast" with the practice of conventional Christianity.

B CRYSTAL 700 Sundays by Billy Crystal

B DOUGLAS *My Stroke of Luck* by Kirk Douglas Inspirational, humorous, down-to-earth. A very quick read. (I read it twice!)

B JONES *Heart of Oak* by Tristan Jones

B MATHABANE *Kaffir Boy in America: An encounter with Apartheid* by Mark Mathabane

This continuation of the true story of a black youth is just as enlightening as the first book about this younger days. The account of his adjustment to the American life and to the separation from his family leads the reader to think about issues beyond everyday life.

B MATHABANE *Kaffir Boy: the true story of a Black youth's coming of age in Apartheid South Africa* by Mark Mathabane

This book is hard to put down. The everyday struggle of this youth to survive in the ghetto filled with violence, starvation, and cultural clashes are inspiring. His family's troubles and his will to overcome the difficulties result in a determination that is rare. Enlightening and disturbing.

B MAYES *A Year in the World* by Frances Mayes For those readers who may never visit Europe, this book offers a vivid, insightful narrative of each country's history, culture and culinary specialties. A must read for world travelers.

B MCCOURT *Angela's Ashes (audio cassette)* by Frank McCourt What a Tale of survival and family. The vivid descriptions of the principal characters as well as the unbelievable living conditions painted an accurate picture of life in Ireland.

B MCCOURT Teacher Man by Frank McCourt

The Essential Cook by Charles Delman 641.5 D
This book offers step by step methods of cooking meat, poultry, fish and vegetables. A good primer for anyone learning the basics of cooking.

Triangle: the Fire that Changed America by David Von Drehle 974.7 V

- Do you know why doors on public buildings open outwards? Long before 9/11, New York City experienced the devastating Triangle Shirtwaist factory Fire (March 26,1911) in which 146 immigrant teenage girls were crushed, burned or jumped to their deaths. The villains included the indifferent owners, the powerful Tammany Hall political machine, the corrupt NYPD, and the absence of sensible fire laws. This climactic event led to the rise of the ILGWU and many fire-laws that we take for granted today. Former New Yorkers will enjoy the parts played by the young Al Smith and Robert Wagner. By the way, a waist is a lady's blouse. A riveting read.
- This is an account of the infamous Triangle Shirtwaist fire with the social events leading up to the March, 1911, date of the fire and the consequences afterwards. This account is interesting for the parallels with the World Trade Center disaster almost a century later.

Amazing Gracie: A Dog's Tale by Dan Dye 636.73 D
A library tech suggested I try this book while waiting for Marley & Me and it was an excellent use of time. My favorite point is that while the author espouses the ides "Do what you love and the money will follow," he also shows that perseverance, patience and hard work is also necessary for success.

The Mechanism of Catastrophe by Speros Vryonis, Jr. 949.61 V A very dry book. It is mostly a statistical analysis of a Muslim program in Turkey in 1955.

All the Best Potatoes by Joie Warner 641.6 W A wonderful variety of recipes!

The Women at the Washington Zoo: Writings on Politics, Family & Fate by Marjorie Williams 975.3 W

A collection of insightful profiles, essays and a final memoir about living for 3 years on BT (borrowed time) after receiving a diagnosis of final stage cancer. Not to be missed: profiles of Barbara and Jeb Bush and the nasty break-up of the Clinton-Gore political marriage: the essay, "The Alchemist" about the author's mother; and the final moving memoir of a young woman in hr 40's facing imminent death.
